ECHANGE OF INFORMATION OF ASIAN PCVE LEADERS ON NATIONAL ACTION PLANS

27-28 August 2018



Director General of National Counter Terrorism Centre, Brigadier General Zakariyyaa Mansoor and a Delegation of Maldivian Counter Radicalization partners participated in a two day workshop themed "Asian Leadership Exchange on Preventing and Countering Violent Extremism National Action Plans".

This workshop is conducted by Hedayah's PCVE National Action Plans Task Force with the support of UNDP. During the two-day program the delegates from government, the security sector, and civil society of Asian Region shared their experiences with NAPs, identified the way ahead, highlighted possible cooperation with other countries and explore the challenges and opportunities.

The workshop gave an opportunity for the countries with more experience on NAP development to share their knowledge with the less experienced nations.

Delegations from Indonesia, Malaysia, Philippines, Thailand, Bangladesh, Maldives and the ASEAN secretariat participated in the two day workshop During the workshop, the participants were:

- Introduced to the global history and architecture surrounding the development of NAPs;
- Provided a forum to share knowledge of PCVE terminology and conceptualization, with a specific focus on the role of grievances, structural conditions and personal factors, as root causes and drivers of violent extremism.;
- Grouped into break out sessions to discuss how they can move from an understanding of the root

causes of extremism in their countries, to policies and programs that are targeted, realistic, and achievable:.

- Given questionnaires to guide them to modify the conceptual framework into their own context, highlighting local insights;
- Briefed on international good practices of how Governments can aid inter-agency and interministry collaboration on the development and delivery of a NAP with a focus on engagement with civil society;
- Given guidance on how to develop and deliver realistic and effective NAP's;
- Briefed on good practices for National Action Plan development and implementation, with an introduction to accessible phased




programmatic approach;

- Given an insight on approaches to improve donor coordination, and how best to ensure that PCVE projects reflect a solid evidence base, are aligned with the NAP framework, and complement, rather than duplicate, efforts of other agencies:
- Introduced to key strategic communications' elements of NAP delivery and online presence and provided examples of how social media is used to propagate and counter violent extremism;
- Briefed on how the UNDP and the Task Force might support country specific requirements and assist in the degign and delivery of follow on programs;

The Hedayah's PCVE National Action Plans Task Force has worked with 21 different countries since its inception in 2013 to facilitate the design and delivery of strategies and accompanying National Action Plans to prevent and counter violent extremism. The Task Force also provides pro bono technical support and training, drawing on emerging international good practices.

In 2016, the United Nations Secretary-General launched the Plan of Action to Prevent Violent Extremism, which recommended that "each Member State should consider developing a national plan of action to prevent conducive to the spread of terrorism; (2) preventing and combatting terrorism; (3) building countries' capacity to prevent and combat terrorism and to strengthen the role of the United Nations in this regard; (4) ensuring respect for human rights for all and the rule of law while countering terrorism.

During the same year, the Member States of the United Nations agreed on a global-strategy to coordinate counter -terrorism efforts. The strategy has four pillars: (1) tackling the conditions United Nations and especially the United Nations Development Program is empowering the nations in achieving the objectives of the four pillars, especially concentrating on the first and the fourth pillar of tackling the conditions conducive to terrorism and ensuring respect for human rights.



ARTICLE REVIEW OF "CHILDREN AT WAR: FOREIGN CHILD RECRUITS OF THE ISLAMIC STATE"



The quantitative analysis of Child Foreign Fighters of Islamic State in 2013 and 2014 by Dakota Foster and Daniel Milton included a dataset of 4100 registered fighters out of which 290 were children under the age of 18. It is alarming as the % of Children in active fighting is higher than 7%




There is an expected increase in the no of Child Foreign Fighters as the age increases.

Though the average is 7% Child Fighters, there are certain nations whose Child Fighter percentages are much higher. Countries like Bahrain, the host Country Syria, Australia, Pakistan and Belgium.

However it was surprising to find that the countries which contributed the majority of adult Foreign Terrorist Fighters contributed comparatively low numbers of Child Fighters. Tunisia, Russia, Morocco and Azerbaijan contributed a larger overall adult foreign fighter percentage, however their Child fighter percentages were lower than 2% of the overall fighters. This may be due to the difficulty of travelling and entering from the countries which are further away from Syria as the percentages of Child Fighters were relatively higher for the host Country Syria (27%), Bahrain (29%), Libya (17%), Turkey (15%) and Saudi Arabia (6%). The fact that it was easier to travel to the war zone may have played a major Role in the marked increase in both the number and relative percentages of Child Fighters from those nations.

Another finding of the study was the relative increase in the no of child fighters from the first quarter of 2013. This result was not surprising as the ISIS fighters started gaining and controlling more ground and entry into Syria became easier, the fighters started taking their families with them. More Child fighters started entering on their own as well.



Another Surprising finding was that a large percentage of the Child Fighters has previous fighting experience. Especially those coming from the conflict zones came with a skillset of war fighting.

The research however disproved the hypothesis that large groups of Child Fighters are entering Syria as the data showed that the majority of Child fighters entered the country as an only child in the group.

It is unfortunate that children are enlisted to fight. This robs them of a bright future. After facing the brutality of war, often without their consent (or at least at an age where they cannot make such weighty decisions), they would return home scarred for life. The nightmare is likely far from over. The governments of the countries from which the fighters went have the arduous task of Deradicalizing, Rehabilitating, and Reintegrating them into the Society. This is a challenging task, however it will be worth the investment.
